“ The intersection of Monroe and Young Streets was the focal point of our neighborhood in the 1960s. It was packed with kids having last names like Adams, Abbott, Lane, Wilcox, Carr, Allen, Scully, Asbell, Barnett, Martin, Dollar, Brock, Deibert, Long and Kirkland. It was formed by 5-6 blocks, alleys, a flowing Creek almost hidden by tall and dense kudzu, beautifully aged towering trees and the nearly limitless imaginations of constantly curious children. The Allen's had a large side yard that typically hosted almost countless baseball, basketball, football games and 'raslin' matches along with other games and gleeful frolics of children who were free as the air surrounding them. Victories were emphatically celebrated. The hill on Monroe Street was where we first learned and experienced the inescapable effects of gravity and acceleration and the abrading ability of asphalt and gravel. Our spirits were nearly indomitable and yet we were usually, but not always, protected from serious injury by the Angels that surrounded us. It was a grand playground, a place of exploration, a training camp and a forge that established a definition of who we would become and from where we came. It has been decades since I last saw or spoke with Gene. In a few years of those times, we were scattered like leaves upon the wind. However, we shared moments of time, in the manner that youngsters can, with enjoyment, re-creation, and in unison with life. Please accept on the behalf of these aforementioned neighbors, our genuine condolences to all Gene's family and friends. May he rest, for all eternity, in peace.....
